Darrambal,	A roadway, footmarks.
Kaliainbal,	An uphill ascent.
Kalianna,	To ascend, to climb up.
Maggadalla,	Red soil.
Mannanbil,	Muddy.
Maunang,	Ground soil.
Mannarganna,	To be wide.
Mannargirang,	Very wide.
Marang,	Good.
Marambir,	Better.
Murru,	A road.
Wallawallang,	Stony.
Warragu,	Limestone
Wirain,	Not level, sloping up.
Wirrhan,	Sloping.
Yuinbur,	This way.
Yumbul,	That way.
Gannandu,	Near, at hand.

Dandarbang,	Very pretty.
Dangal,	A shelter.
Darramial,	A shallow place like a basin
Darrandurai,	A corner.
Darrang,	A little creek.
Gungan,	A running stream.
Gunngang,	A little stream.
Gimbar,	A spring, a well, a fountain.
Guabinga,	To rest, to sit.
Gawier,	A house.
Garngan,	Very strong.
Narambang,	Very good.
Ngurruarra,	My own.
Ngurrawng,	A nest of a bird.
Ngurang,	A camp, a nest.
Ngulluman,	A watercourse down a hill.
Wullar,	A waterhole in rocks.
